MEETING CALLED TO ORDER @ 9:01a.m. by Chair Riker.

Chair Riker read a prepared statement: Apprenticeship is a culture this is both collegial and inclusive. We expect all of those interested in attending Apprenticeship public meetings to feel welcome to attend and participate. To be clear, we condemn any act or threat of physical violence, harassment, intimidation, or bullying at any public meeting. And I, as Chair, if I notice any of this happening, I will ask you to be escorted from the building. So, please, some of these items can be contentious amongst the various parties. WE will treat each other with respect. And we will advance the issue of Apprenticeship in Washington State. We thank you for your adherence to these principles.

ANCESTRAL LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT AND BLESSING: Hanford McCloud, from the Nisqually Indian Tribe gave the background and history of Thurston and Pierce Counties and the Nisqually Indian Tribe. Hanford also showed his basket weaving skills with the hat he was wearing.

GREETING: Joel Sacks, Director of Labor and Industries shared how Apprenticeship fits directly with the organization's mission. Apprenticeship keeps Washington safe and working. Director Sacks shared apprenticeship makes sure the work that gets done in the state gets done in a safe way that protects the public. He thanked everyone on behalf of the public who can go into buildings and drive on roads, on behalf of employers that have a workforce that can do what needs to get done, thank you for the work you do. State Board for Community and Technical Colleges

Dr. Genevieve Howard reported for summer 2023 the apprenticeship head count was at 3,059; a 25 percent increase from the previous summer. On November 28, Governor Inslee visited Renton Technical College to meet with Carpentry apprenticeship and tour the facilities. She also said they are continuing to work on the implementation of the Washington College Grant for apprentices.

U.S. DOL, Office of Apprenticeship

No report was provided.

Washington State Apprenticeship Coordinators Association

Jeremy Clevenger reported Nick Weathers from Helmets to Hardhats have expended funding and are asking the programs to update their entries on their website to help those veterans for the future. Peter Lahmann from Department of Veterans Affairs reported they are working on language to include veteran spouses in transitional agreements. There was also a discussion about the possibility of doing January meetings on a virtual platform.

Washington Student Achievement Council

No report was provided.

Workforce Training and Education Coordinating Board

Andrew Lenderman gave some highlights from their 21-22 report. Apprenticeships are the number one outstanding investment in the state of Washington in this report. The employment rate for the 21,500 participants is 92 percent with a median annual earnings of \$104,600 for those who completed the program. The ten-year taxpayer return on investment was \$7.80 to \$1.00.

Secretary, Washington State Apprenticeship and Training Council

Celeste Monahan reported the apprenticeship system served 17,525 active apprentices in the fourth quarter. 1,138 of new registrations and 560 completion credentials. Chuck Ames, Michelle Stout and Kyle Wohlenhaus were hired in the last quarter. As of April 2023, about 200 apprentices have requested to be connected to resources as a result of the Apprentice Well-Being Survey.

WSATC Childcare in the Trades Subcommittee

Shana Peschek reported they had a presentation by the Washington State Department of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF) about the eligibility for childcare subsidies and how to apply and how it is determined. There was a discussion around apprentices going on unemployment and how to secure their slot in childcare; possibly asking for unemployment for a childcare subsidy. Chair Riker asked for a report at a future meeting on what changes have actually been implemented from recommendations.

Additional priorities for the year are to define "complete application"; "sustainability plan"; "living wage"; and review the Industry Sector Platform submission timelines and deadlines. Chari Riker requested Suzanne Schmidt, State Representative, be an ex-officio member.
